Our Solution

To support everyone visiting the Children in Scotland website, Recite Me accessibility assistive technology was installed. Adding Recite Me to their website is another step-in making Children in Scotland communications as accessible as they should be and removing barriers for disabled people to take part in what we do.

The move also reflects their ongoing commitment to accessible communications and formed part of our activity marking World Children's Day and the 30th anniversary of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC).
